## Pressing forward in Citi Soleil

### Greetings from Mission Ranch.

We continue to make progress at Mission Ranch with the Lord's rich blessings. Our Mission Ranch Medical Clinic is in full flight seeing between 200-300 patients per week. Our children are doing well and growing quickly. Our church services continue under the tent in front of the clinic. All is well at Mission Ranch.

Our future looks strong as we undertake the construction of our new Mission Ranch Worship Center. However, the earth quake left us with a severely damaged building structure that was our previous worship center.

Our solution is to renovate this building and turn it into a larger orphanage for our children. We have wanted to add smaller children into our program and need the proper facilities to care for them. This 36 x 48 building will have a larger kitchen and food preparation area.

We still cook all meals using charcoal, fire and a rebar stove. The extra space will be useful for preparing a larger quantity of meals and maintaining better ventilation in the cooking area. We are searching for funding at this time.



# How About Haiti?

Haiti continues to suffer as the rainy season's storms are taking a dreadful toll on the weathered tent cities. Many of the tents and tarps have already passed their life spans in the relentless sun and wind that blankets the island. With over one million Haitians in tents or fabric shelters it is only a matter of time before one good storm ramps up the misery that has been the main staple of life for the last nine months. There are 105 thousand temporary homes being built as we speak. But that takes time and time is not on Haiti's side. The Haitian Govt. has relocated many Haitians away from Port Au Prince as you see in the photo below. They are left on their own with little support or future.



Why is rebuilding so slow? It is not slow in relation to the size of the tragedy. Consider 400 World Trade Centers collapsing at one time and you will begin to understand the amount of rubble that is created. There are still thousands of collapsed buildings with bodies inside. It will take 3–10 years to get to them all.

Many buildings are privately owned and may never be demolished or removed. The rebuilding is substantially defeated by the lack of land owner records. It is not possible at this time to rebuild on a property that does not have a current deed.

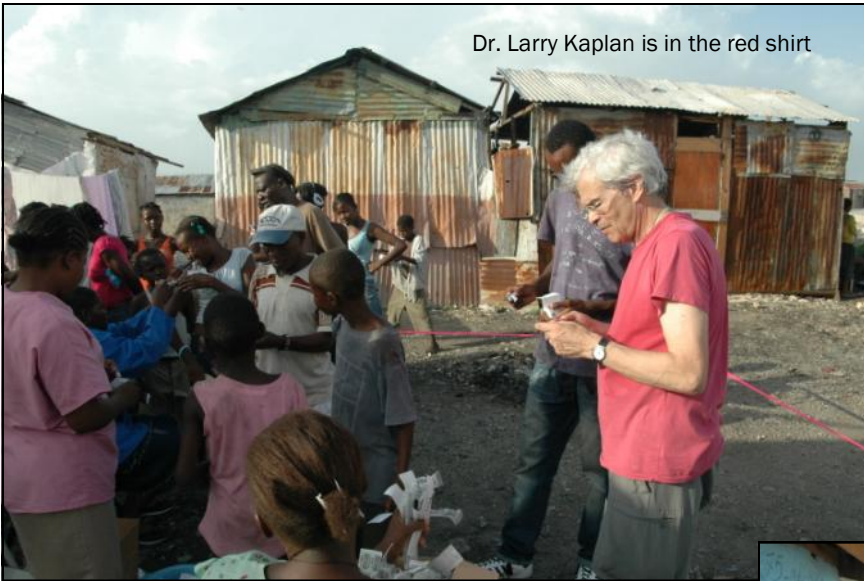

# Vaccination In Citi Soleil

Under the tireless work and supervision of our very own Board Member, Dr. Larry Kaplan, Mission Ranch was able to obtain 1500 units of Diphtheria Vaccination. Dr Kaplan created a cold supply chain from Boston MA. to Citi Soleil, Haiti that preserved the vaccinations throughout the journey. The vaccinations were timely due to a diphtheria outbreak in the slum just two weeks before. With the help of the Mission Ranch staff, Dr. Kaplan organized a vaccination program in the impoverished area of

Souterre, an often forgotten part of the slum. This was a stunning success and the local population was grateful for their blessing.

Not stopping there, Dr Kaplan took the Mission Ranch nurses and went to the busy streets in north Citi Soleil and provided hundreds immunizations for the Haitians. Then it was off to the tent cities of Citi Soleil, then the grand finale at the Mission Ranch Triage area. It was a wonderful fanfare of good will, good medicine and good humanitarian service.

# Angels in Florida

One of the largest blessings for Mission Ranch has been meeting an organization called Haiti Clinic. Early in 2009 I had the privilege to meet Sharon McLaren, one of the pioneers of this medical organization. A bond formed and a future opened up for our Mission Ranch Medical Clinic. Prior to this time Mission Ranch was noticeably deficient in medical care and services yet hundreds of sick and injured Haitians continued to find their way to us. The patient load was beginning to overwhelm Mission Ranch and we prayed for an answer to our needs. The Lord came through in a magnificent way.

Haiti Clinic is much like Doctors Without Borders. They provide doctors, nurses and medical personnel to travel to Haiti to do medical services for the impoverished. It was not long after that Haiti Clinic called Mission Ranch their home base in Citi Soleil. This extraordinary organization took over providing an in house doctor, pharmacist, nurses, and provided medical supplies, The cost of such an undertaking ranged between \$5,000.00 to \$9,000 per month yet Haiti Clinic remained resilient to this new challenge.

In early 2010, Sharon passed the torch to Dr. Neil Heskell and Haiti Clinic began to focus on Mission Ranch and the desperate needs of Citi Soleil. They started with monthly medical missions to Mission Ranch. Shortly after they increased to two missions per month. Each mission would serve between 700 - 1200 patients in 2 days.



Haiti Clinic draws on a deep list of skilled doctors, nurses and medical staff. The services that they bring to Mission Ranch are remarkable. Each patient is treated with absolute respect, value and kindness, something that impoverished Haitians seldom see.

The impact that Haiti Clinic has made on Citi Soleil is beyond words. Many lives have been saved because of this organization. Patients come from up to 20 miles to get help. All medical services are provided at no charge.
